## **Regulatory Reform: Improving Permit Timeliness**

## (See also <u>agencies' response</u> for full context to Washington State Auditor's Office (SAO) <u>report</u>, December 2013)

Agencies included in the performance audit: Agriculture, Archeology & Historic Preservation, Ecology, Fish and Wildlife, Health, Labor and Industries, Licensing, Department of Natural Resources (DNR), Revenue, Transportation, Gambling Commission, Liquor Control Board, State Parks and Recreation Commission, and the Utilities and Transportation Commission. DNR is governed by a separately elected official and provided an independent response.

SAO Issues Summary:

- 1. Agencies do not always know how long business permit decisions take, and they do not always give businesses information they have.
- 2. Regulatory agencies have simple, low-cost opportunities to reduce the time it takes for a business permit decision.
