- Growth limiter



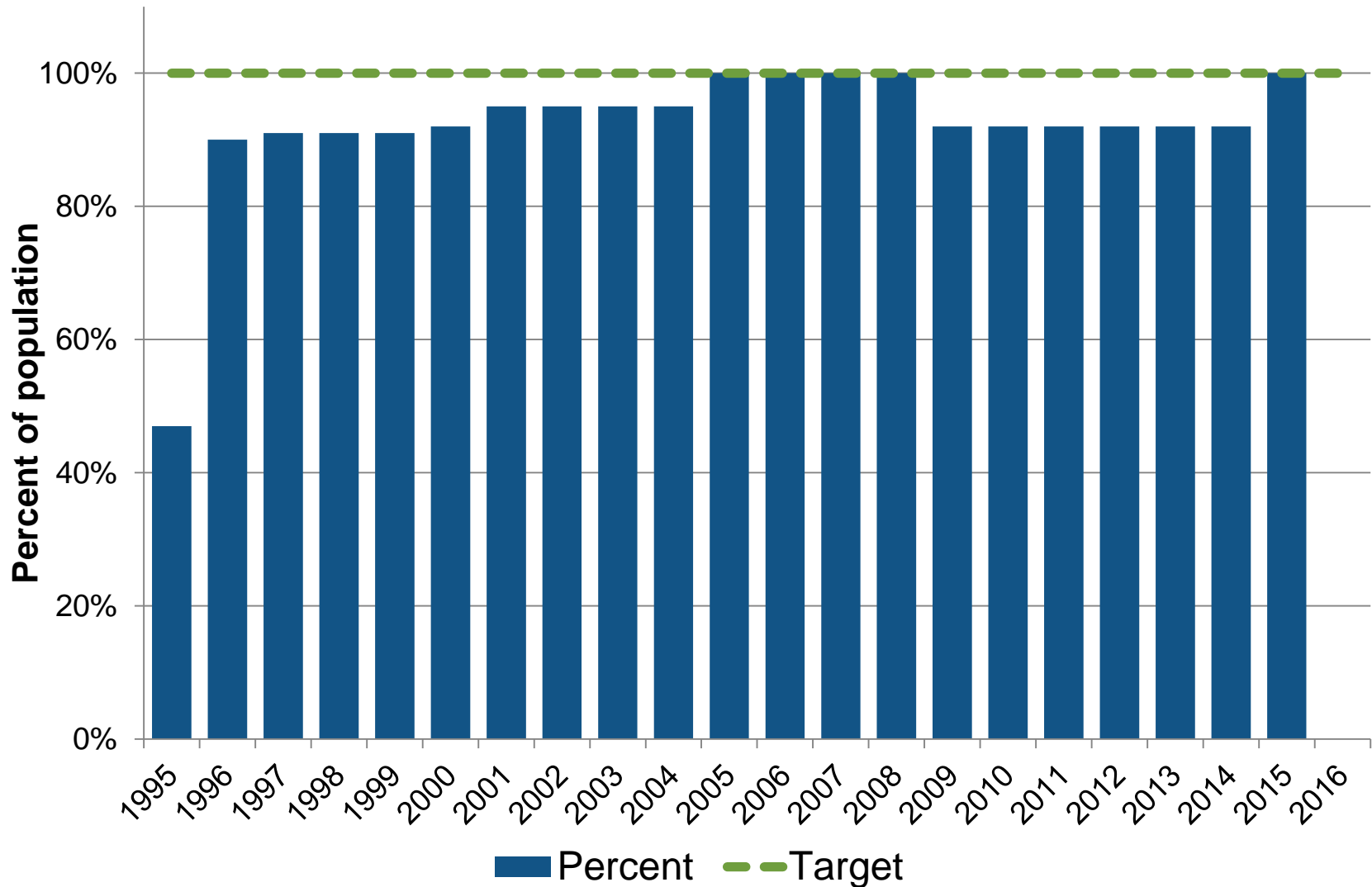

STANDARDS FROM 92% TO 100% BY 2020.**



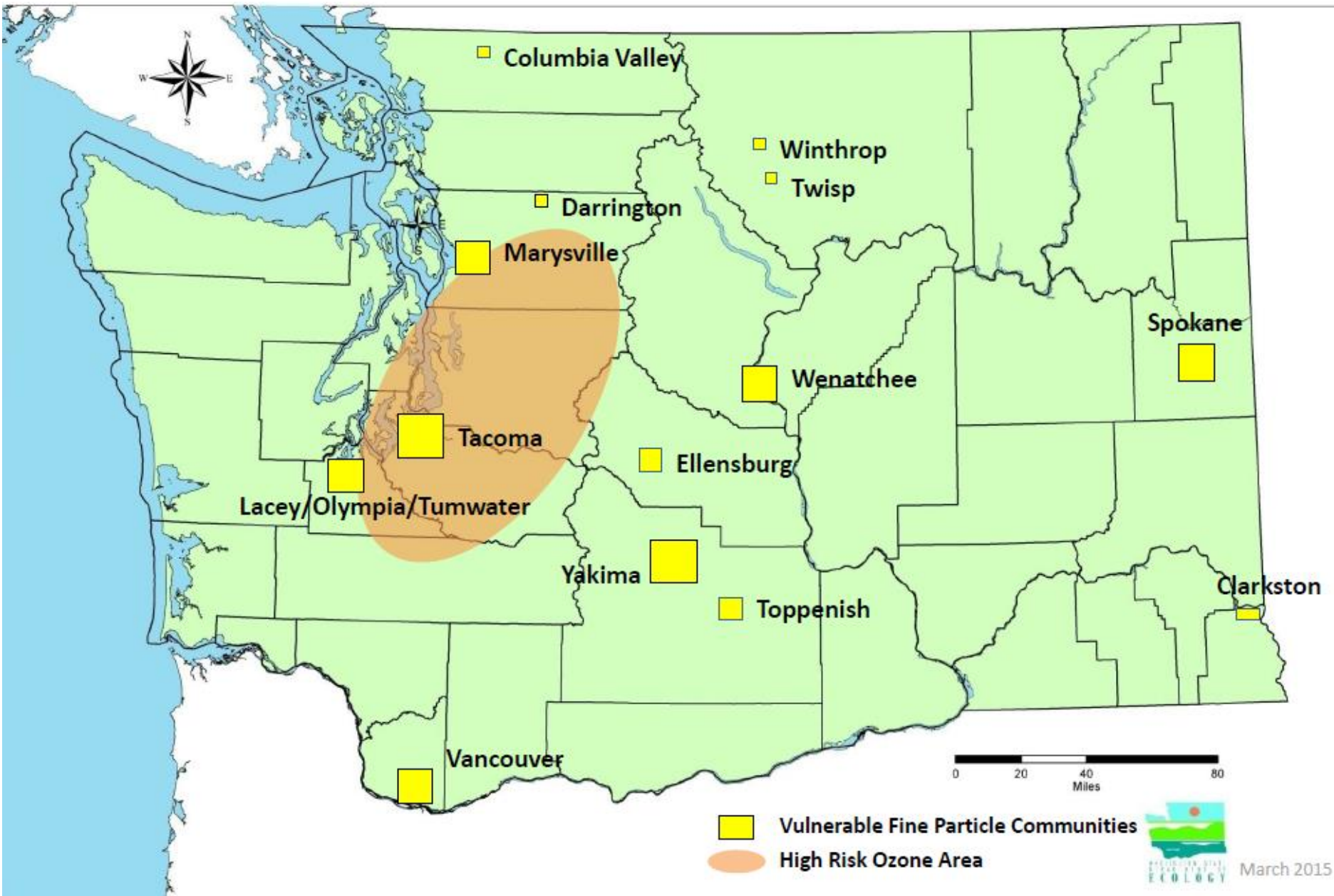

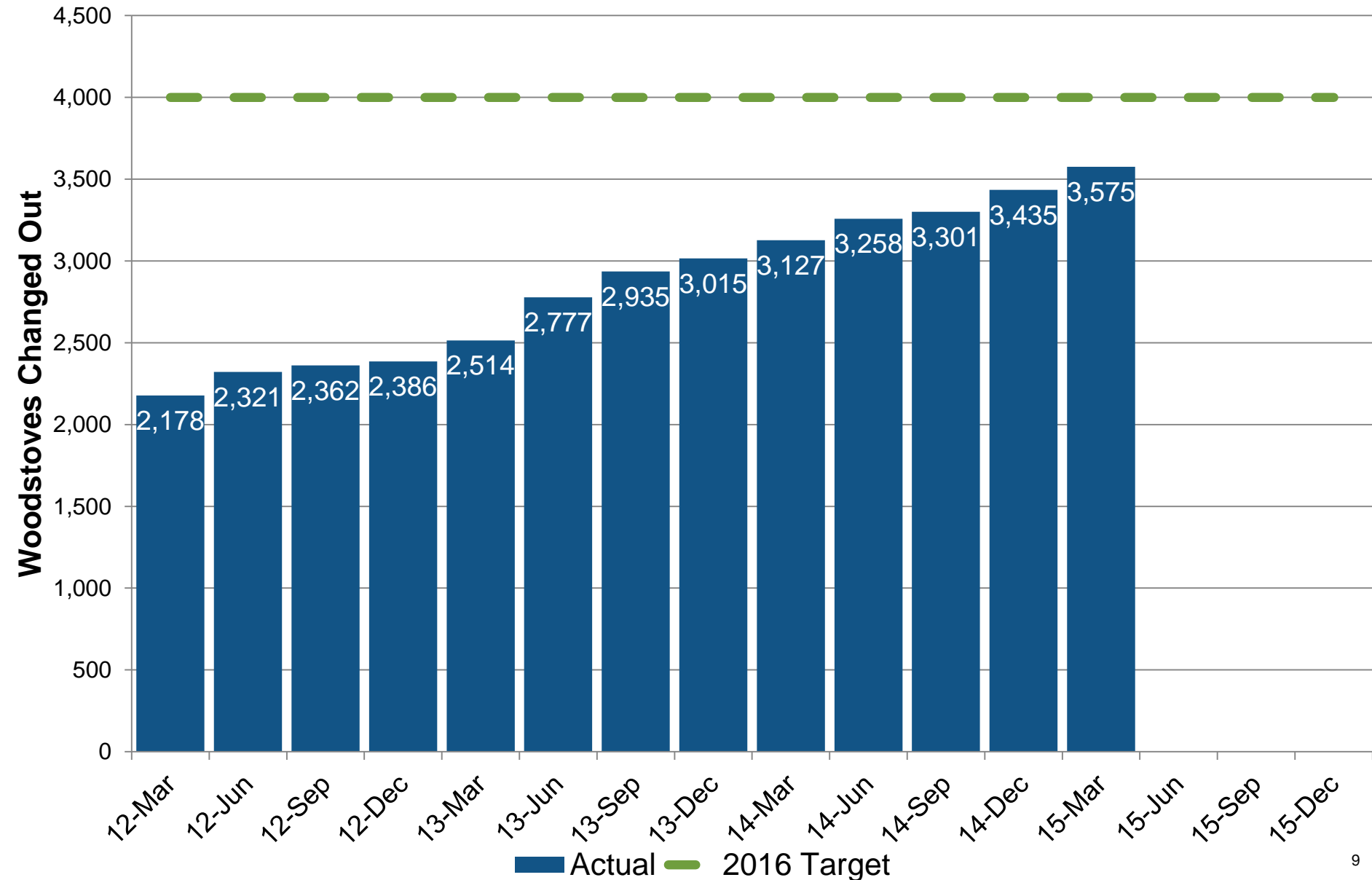

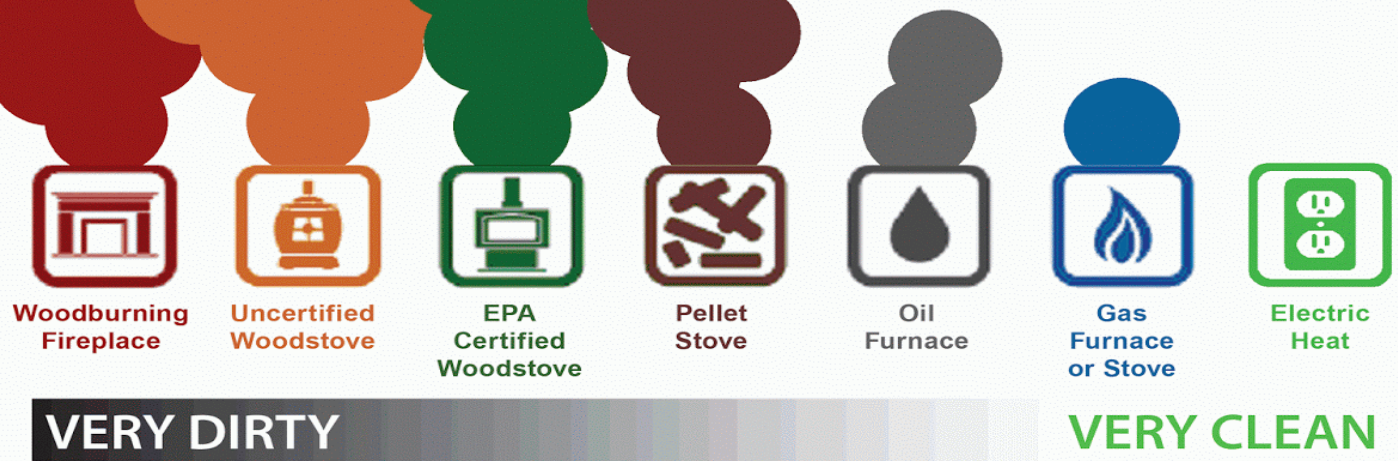

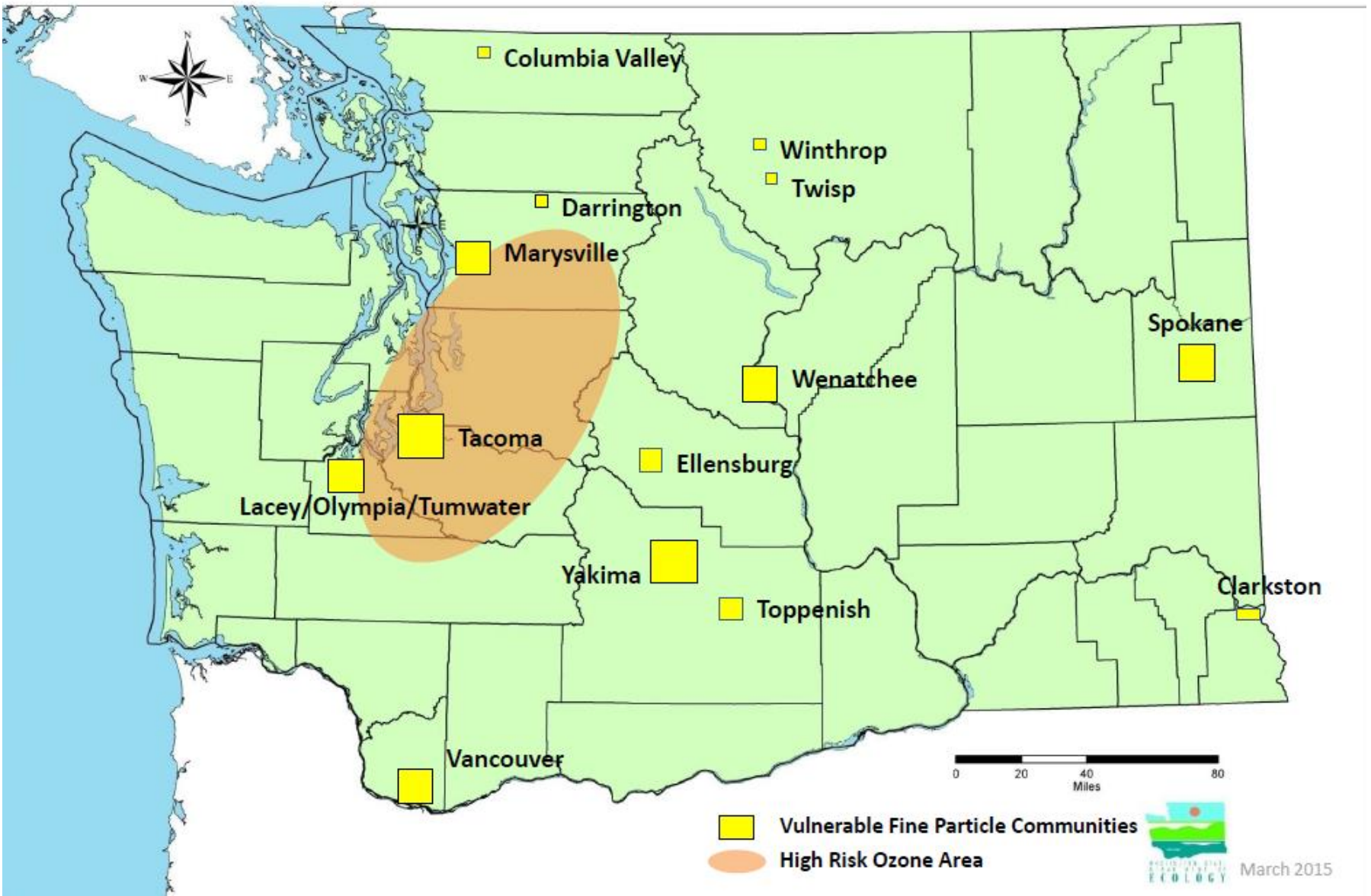

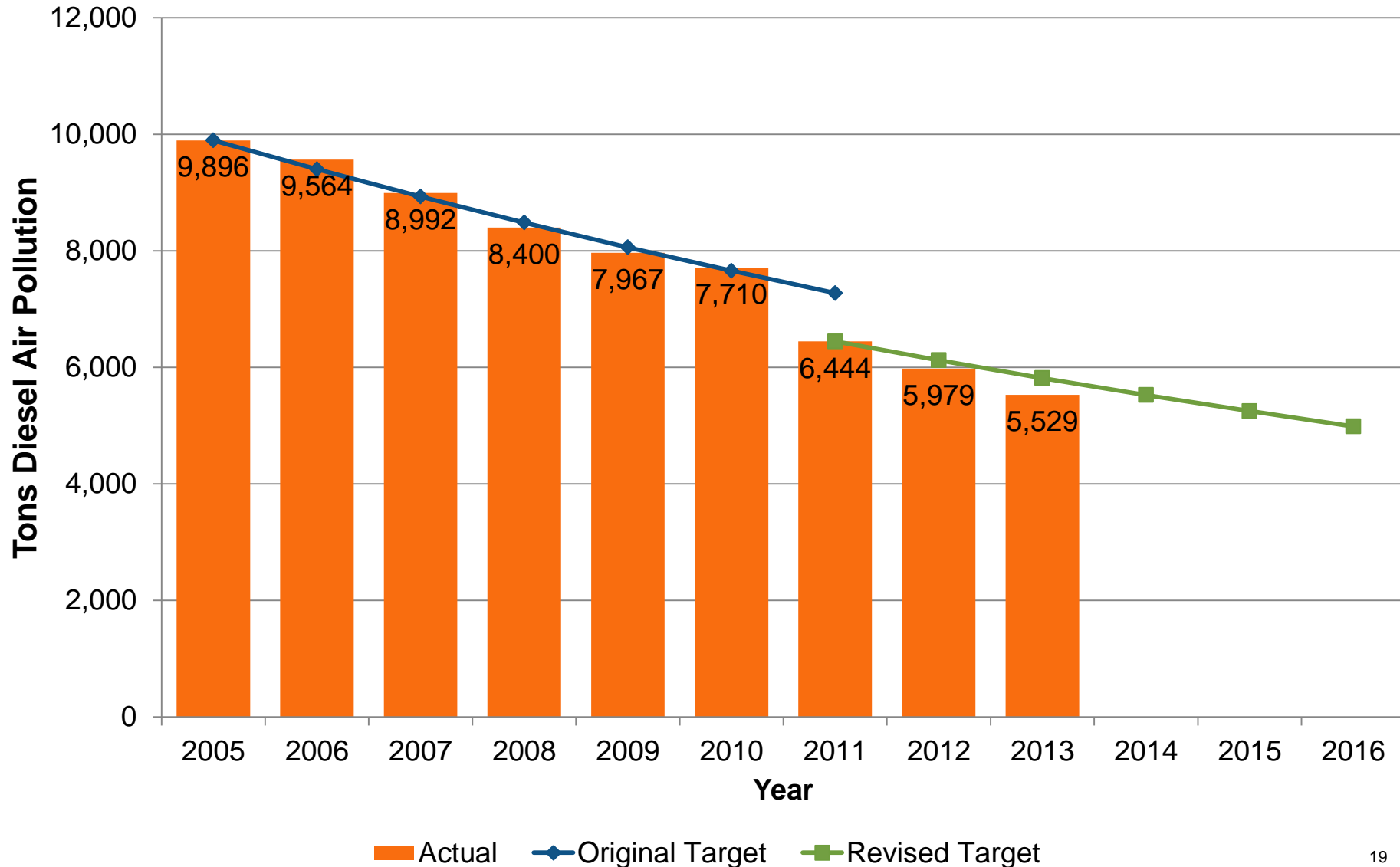
