


Background:

- Increasing educational opportunity ensures Washingtonians are able to compete for the best jobs





Total	73,469	0.7%
Certificates (at least a year)	10,162	-7.3%
Associate Degrees	29,998	+2.4%
Bachelor's Degrees	33,309	+1.9%

Degree awards are not on pace to meet the target.

- Total awards increased by less than 1% in the past three years.
- Decline of over 800 long-term certificate awards over past three years (-7.3%).
- Bachelor's and Associate Awards have increased only slightly in the past three years (+2.2% combined rate).


Problem: Gaps in Attainment Persist



Attainment gaps persist for certain populations.

- Hispanic population is overrepresented among those with less than a high school diploma and underrepresented at all other levels of educational attainment.
 - Black, American Indian, and Pacific Islander populations are also underrepresented among college graduates.

Opportunity: Adults with some college will benefit from further education



- Nearly 800,000 adults in Washington ages 25-44 have a high school diploma but have not completed a college degree and are not enrolled.
- One-third of these adults have attended at least a year of college.
- Finishing their college credential would improve career earnings and employment outcomes.

Strategies:
