

### End AIDS 2020 Goals



- 1. Reduce the rate of new HIV diagnoses by 50%.
- Increase the percentage of People Living With HIV who have a suppressed viral load to 80%.
- 3. Reduce the mortality rates for People Living With HIV by 25%.
- 4. Reduce HIV-related health disparities.
- Improved quality of life for People Living With HIV.

## End AIDS Framework: 4 Strategies



### Getting people insured.

Health insurance coverage connects people to healthcare. People can be tested for HIV, get PrEP, treatment, and receive other services to stay healthy.



### Getting people tested.

People who know their HIV status can make informed decisions about their health. After getting an HIV test, people at-risk for HIV can get PrEP, and PLWH can get medical care and treatment.



#### Getting at-risk people on PrEP.

PrEP helps at-risk people avoid infection. Taking PrEP allows an at-risk individual to take an active role in staying negative.




#### Getting HIV-positive people on treatment.

Treatment helps PLWH stay healthy and reduce the chance they pass HIV to others.



  - Persons who inject drugs



New HIV Diagnoses in Relation to Population Density Washington State, 2010-2014 (n=2,460)




Late HIV Dx by Race, Nativity, WA State, 2011-2015

Viral Load Suppression by Race, Nativity, WA State, 2016







based on HIV surveillance data reported through October 2017




