


Percent of Youth of Color in WA Population, Detention Admissions and Juvenile Rehabilitation (JR) Residents, 2012



- The Washington Juvenile Justice system is a collaboration between 39 counties and the state DSHS Juvenile Rehabilitation program (JR).
- Most youth are served solely in the county programs, including detention.
- Only youth with the most complex needs and serious crimes are served by the state Juvenile Rehabilitation facilities.

Percent of Youth of Color in WA Population, Detention Admissions and Juvenile Rehabilitation Residents, 2012




Data quality for Hispanic/Latino youth is poor due, in part, to limitations in the data reporting systems used by law enforcement and confusion among staff about varying definitions and data systems. As a result, many Hispanic/Latino youth are likely counted as White, overinflating the counts for White youth and undercounting Hispanic/Latino youth.

(Arrest rates per 1,000 persons age 10-17)




Decreases supported by:




